INTRODUCTION TO SNOWY MOUNTAINS CHRISTIAN SCHOOL

Snowy Mountains Christian School (SMCS) lies at the heart of the Snowy Monaro region and since 1997, teaches students through a Biblical worldview about this world and how to impact it for the glory of God.

In 2023, the Principal Mrs Ella Meyer, teachers and staff engaged in nurturing the spiritual, academic, emotional, and physical wellbeing and character of 67 students, from Kindergarten to Year 10. Through smaller class sizes, rigorous pedagogy and nurturing relationships between teachers, parents and students, students progressed in their studies in accordance with the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) curriculum and this characterises the student body. Each area is taught from a Christian viewpoint, bringing all of the Bible to all of life. Through activities and events such as serving on the Student Service Council; Book Week activities; international competition papers (ICAS); camp adventures and many more activities, students were given opportunities to learn, develop, and apply skills beyond the classroom and into the world, making their mark on the world.

The school relies heavily on the warm community by which it is supported, including the many people who volunteer their time whether it is on the School Board, in the library, supporting our Information and Communications Technology, fundraising, tending the school grounds, or listening to students read. - ~ equips the hand.


This year, our focus verse was from Psalm 33:4;

 - Science Fair, where students presented their projects to judges from Snowy Hydro Limited, Mr. Toriki Pitt and Mr. Lachlan Marks.
 - Tech Talk, presented by Mr. Brad Lidster, about backing up your documents and photos, providing hints and tips to ensure you don't lose your important documents and memories.
 - Book Week, including Book Fair and Book Parade with invited preschool children.
 - Secondary Mental Health First Aid course for Secondary students.
 - Shine program for pre-teenage girls facilitated by Mrs. Groves.
 - Our Showcase Evening, celebrating the God-given skills and talents of our students.

During 2023, we farewelled Ms. Krista Elliott and Ms. Maggie Knoll, and we wish them well as they move into other areas of life. We welcomed a new teacher, Mr. Brad Lidster, who started teaching full time in 2023. We welcomed new Teacher's Aids: Miss. Jessica Stibbard, Mrs. Christa Beere, and Mrs. Judy Taylor. They have been a huge encouragement to the staff and students, and we are very thankful for their wide-ranging contributions to the school community.

We are thankful for our partnership with the Cooma Baptist Church, which also included delivering breakfast to the students twice a week. This ministry is very needed, and the students enjoy having breakfast together.

The Fundraising Team worked hard and enthusiastically to raise money for the school. Their fundraising enabled the purchase of new outdoor tables, chairs and other necessary items for the school's use.

Our students have had a rich variety of learning experiences. We look forward to seeing the growth in all our young people as we continue to deliver Christ-centred education, which is Biblically faithful, academically rigorous, and culturally engaging.

BOARD CHAIR REPORT


It has been on my mind that the message of the gospel must be at the forefront of everything that we do. The hope that we have from this message is not futile.

It is pleasing to note that our student numbers have remained consistent throughout 2023. Our Registration and Accreditation to operate as a school is in the renewal process and the necessary documentation is being collated for submission to NESA for 2024.



We are incredibly grateful to Mrs Kamenyitzky who agreed to go along as our team manager for the day.

This was a big job, and one which required her to be at the pool from early in the morning to late in the afternoon. Fortunately, she was ably assisted by some wonderful parents, who took the time to not only transport their children to the carnival, but also who helped by fulfilling our duties throughout the day.

As a small school, we are immensely proud of our students and their wonderful effort at the carnival. Our school placed 3rd in the primary division and 6th in the secondary division.

Athletics Carnival

We held our annual Athletics Carnival on Friday 9th June 2023. This year we had the whole school competing in their events at Snowy Oval. It was wonderful to see the lower primary joining in and being encouraged by the older students. It was a wonderful day with a couple of records being broken over the course of the day.

Zone Athletics

Snowy Mountains Christian School has won the CSSA Primary School Zone Athletics Wainwright Shield for the first time this year! Points for the shield are calculated based on the number of students in the school and the number competing at the carnival, together with results on the day.

Three Secondary students and nine Primary students attended the CSSA Zone Athletics carnivals held at the Kerryn McCann Athletics track in Wollongong on Thursday 3rd August and Friday 4th August.

For our three eight-year-old girls, Rachael Davis, Summer Oliveira and Maggie Mills, it was the first time they had ever had the opportunity to compete at this level. Also travelling to Wollongong as part of our athletics team were Ruby Wassink, Poppy Dunkerley, Matthew Groves, Joshua Mills, Blake Davis, Jordan Groves, Xavier Pond, and Sam Pond.

All the students performed well, with many of them recording personal bests.

Matthew Groves won the 11-year-old boys Age Champion, with 1st in long jump, 100m, High Jump and 200m. He also came 2nd in 800m and 3rd in the 1500m.

State Athletics

Primary students, Matthew Groves and Blake Davis attended the CSSA State Athletics carnival at Blacktown International Sports Park, after qualifying for the event at the CSSA Zone Athletics carnival in Nowra.

Blake competed in the Discus event and achieved 9th place.

Matthew was 2nd in Long Jump with a personal best jump of 4.49m; 1st in High Jump with a personal best jump of 1.46m; 8th in 800m; 12th in 100m and 17th in 1500m.

Matthew has qualified to compete in long jump and high jump at the Combined Independent Schools State Carnival to be held in Sydney on September 19.

Secondary student, Samson Pond also competed in the CSSA State Athletics at the Secondary Carnival at Olympic Park on August 24. Samson ran in the 200m and achieved 11th place.

NSW All Schools and Primary Schools Athletics Championships

In the school holidays on Sunday 24th and Monday 25th of September, Blake Davis travelled to Sydney to represent SMCS in the NSW All Schools and Primary Schools Athletics Championships. He competed in discus and placed 7th, and in shot put and placed 10th.

Secondary Futsal Gala Day

Tuesday 24th October, the Secondary students set off to Canberra to join in a Futsal Gala day with Covenant Christian School, Brindabella Christian School, and Emmaus Christian School.

The day was full of highs and lows with each team giving their all in each game. The students learnt important teamwork skills and remembering to defend when the other team had the ball. Each team developed in their skills over the day which was seen in their last games. After a long day of playing 20 minutes games, the 9/10 boys team and the 7-10 girls team played four games each, and the 7/8 boys team played five games, the students were thoroughly exhausted. The students represented SMCS well and were praised for their effort by teachers from the other schools.

STUDENT ENROLMENTS AND ATTENDANCE RECORDS

The total enrolment for all our students from Kindergarten to Year 10, at the Commonwealth Census date in August 2023 was 67 students, with 42 students in Primary and 25 in Secondary.

The average attendance rate in 2023 was 87.74 which was higher than 2022, which was 85.03%.

The attendance record of each student is monitored by their classroom teacher and a record of attendance is kept at the school office and in software. Any absences without a written explanation from home are to be followed up by the classroom teacher. Persistent non-attendance, for reasons other than known illnesses or approved activities, is referred to the Principal.

The small school population promotes a family atmosphere and helps us to better cater for the individual needs of each student.

Post-school Destinations

Of our five Year 10 students, five have enrolled in senior secondary studies at other schools and TAFE.

All Year 10 students had their marks recorded with NESA to qualify for their ROSA.





STUDENT ENROLMENTS AND ATTENDANCE RECORDS

Management of non-attendance

SMCS utilise electronic rolls and rolls are marked each day.

A student absentee sheet is issued to staff. A student is required to provide a note from parents/guardians for both partial absences and full day absences. If a note is still not forthcoming:

- a) The parent/guardian is called and asked to submit a note.
- b) A letter is sent to the parent (Unexplained Absence Note) to again remind them of their child's absence on that particular day, or period of time. This is kept with the student absences and archived during the year.
- c) The Coordinator informs the Principal that no note has been submitted.
- d) The Principal calls the parents/guardians & informs them that if a note is not forthcoming the next day, a letter will be sent informing them of the absence & that their child is Absent Without Reason (Unexplained Absence).
- e) Dependent upon the outcome, the Principal will then inform Community and Justice Services of the absence.

At the end of each term, teachers are to record all absent days (full days). These are to be noted on each student's report at the end of Semester 1 & 2. Community and Justice Services will be notified at any time if staff/Principal are concerned for the welfare of any child at the school.

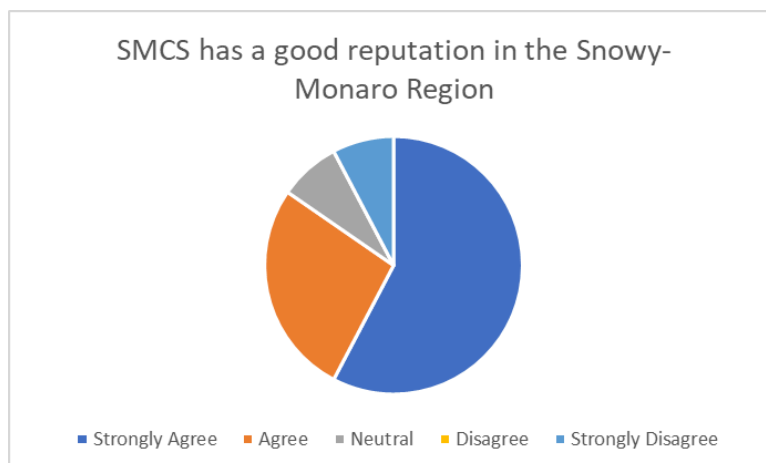
26 families completed the survey. 58% of families had primary students, 31% secondary and 12% across both primary and secondary.

Longevity wise, 38% of families who have been at SMCS for 3-5 years completed the survey, then 19% for both 2 years and under, and 25% of families who have been at SMCS for 5-10 years completed the survey.

Based on cohort, Secondary parents are most happy, then Primary, and for families across both Primary and Secondary, satisfaction varies across the questions



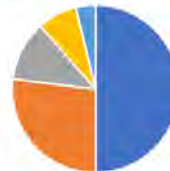

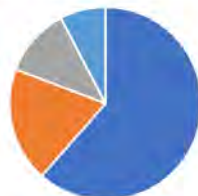

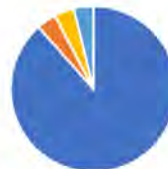

Teacher Qualifications

All staff are committed Christians who subscribe to the school's Statement of Faith and all teachers and aides are committed to teaching from the perspective of a Christian worldview. We have an appropriate spread of age and experience giving a balance of maturity and discernment. National backgrounds include Australian and there are no Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander staff employed in the school.

In accordance with NSW Education Standards Authority guidelines, all six teachers reported in the 2023 Annual Census hold a recognised teaching qualification from a higher education institution within Australia (or a qualification recognised by the National Office of Overseas Skill Recognition). That is, they hold a degree in Education or a degree related to their field of teaching with a Diploma in Education.

Professional courses attended by staff

Teacher and Staff Professional Development remains a high priority but, as has been noted in previous years, this can be difficult to arrange due to financial constraints and our geographical distance from larger cities. The school gratefully acknowledges that several activities were funded or subsidised by Commonwealth grants made available through the Association of Independent Schools.

Individual staff members attended Professional Development courses in their specialised areas. On their return to school, they shared their learning with the rest of the staff at the next Staff Meeting.

The Principal attended the CSA Principals' Networking Conference with other NSW Principals, learning more about the legal situation and changes that impact the school management.



FINANCE REPORT

Snowy Mountains Christian School Limited (SMCS) recorded a surplus in 2023 of \$84,739, similar to the surplus of 2022, \$91,112.

The surplus was mainly due to the continued funding from Commonwealth and State Government, in addition to the AISNSW, with wonderful grants that have helped improve teacher professional development and student engagement and learning, particularly after the impact of the pandemic.

There were 67 enrolments based on the 2023 August census, down from 78 in 2022. The Company's results for the year were as follows:

Income totalled \$1,689,959 and consisted of Commonwealth and State Government recurrent grants of \$1,477,680 and included a Schools Upgrade Fund of \$25,000, AISNSW grants of \$24,981, increased donations of \$34,433, fundraising of \$6,748 and fees and private income of \$146,117, which included interest income of \$6,091.

Costs for the day-to-day operation of the school ('operating costs') totalled \$1,605,220 which comprised staff salaries and related expenses of \$1,283,090, non-salary expenses of \$230,939 which included \$47,276 of depreciation and interest of \$4,281, and capital expenditure of \$91,191.

With the granting of Schools Upgrade Fund, Snowy Hydro STEM Grant, and Sporting Schools Grants, SMCS undertook property improvements and acquisitions totalling \$91,101. This included replacement of and purchase of playground surface, air conditioner and air purifier, LEGO Learning System and Robotics kits, gym equipment, as well as the continued acquisition of new ICT equipment including computers and televisions for classrooms.

Total current assets increased by \$44,901 during the year, from \$376,110 in 2022 to \$421,011 in 2023, while the total current liabilities also increased by \$39,766 from \$218,233 in 2022 to \$257,999 in 2023.

Net assets (total assets minus total liabilities) increased by \$84,738 from \$1,478,472 in 2022 to \$1,563,210 in 2023.

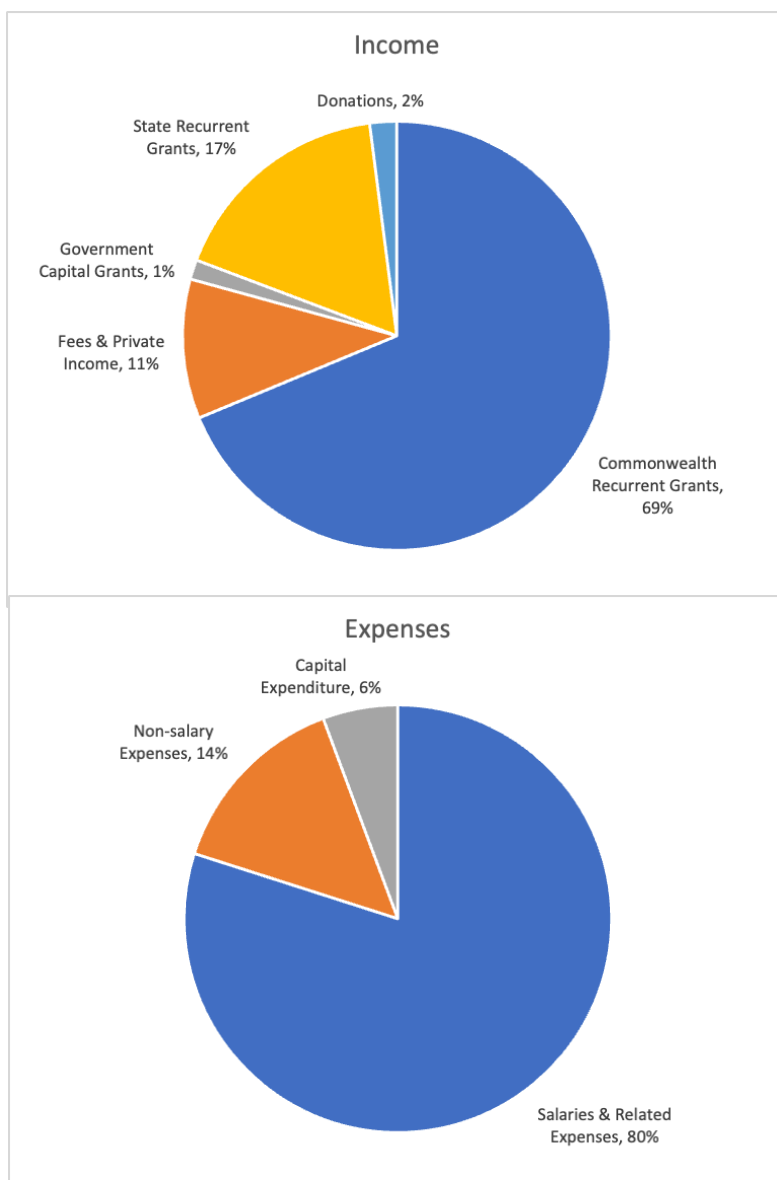
The long-term debt (non-current liabilities) decreased by \$35,689 from \$284,764 in 2022 to \$249,075 in 2023 due to the continued repayment of loans.

Cash held at year end after all school activities was \$382,158.

Contingent Liabilities have reduced to \$40,000 down from \$171,429 in 2022, leaving only 1 liability. This loan amount is reduced by 5% each year if the school remains in operation until 2027 when the loan will cease to exist.

NAPLAN

Every year, students in Year 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN).

Students sit each test online except for the writing test for Year 3 which is completed on paper. Students are tested for their writing, language conventions (grammar and spelling), reading and numeracy. Each student tried their best in each test.

Results in the 2023 NAPLAN for Year 3, Year 5, Year 7, and Year 9 are as follows:

- Due to our small number of students in Year 3 and Year 7 in 2023, we do not have a comparison for these years. NAPLAN requires the minimum of 11 participants per for a comparison to be available.
- Year 5 results were close to the national average in Writing, Spelling, and Numeracy and Grammar, and above the national average for Reading.
- Year 9 results were close to the national average for Writing and Spelling, and above the national average for Reading, Grammar and Numeracy.

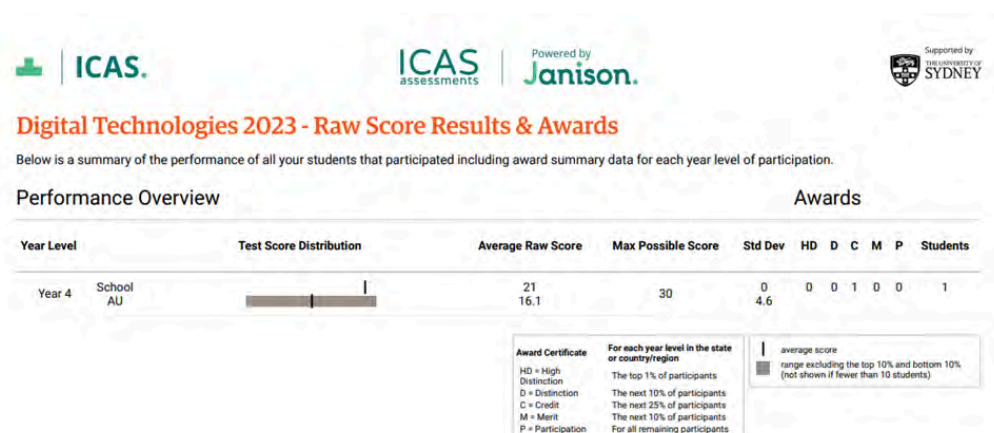
"ICAS is designed to target students' higher-order thinking and problem-solving skills in English, Mathematics, Science, Writing, Spelling Bee and Digital Technologies."

The assessments are suitable for students wishing to extend themselves academically and take up the personal challenge of competing in an international assessment.

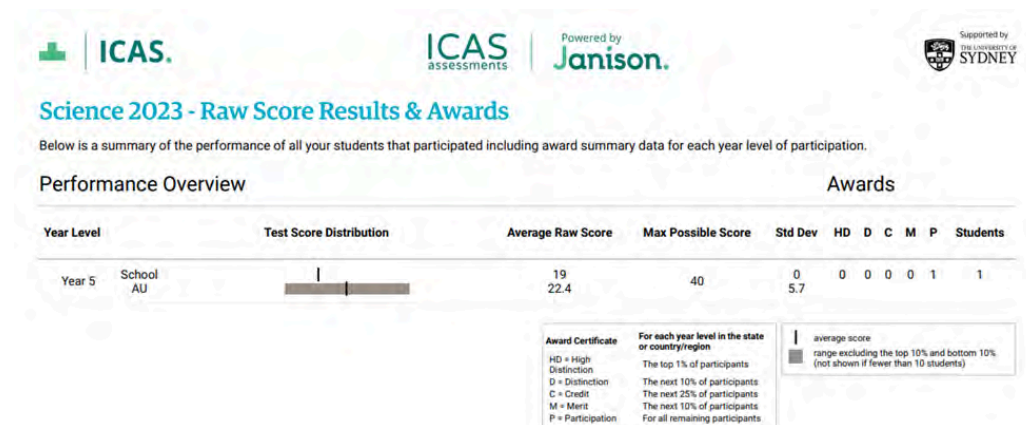
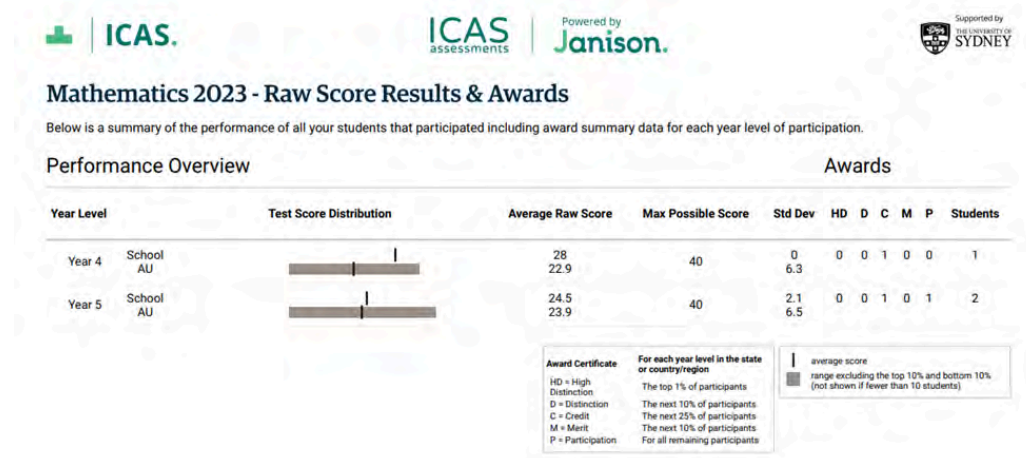
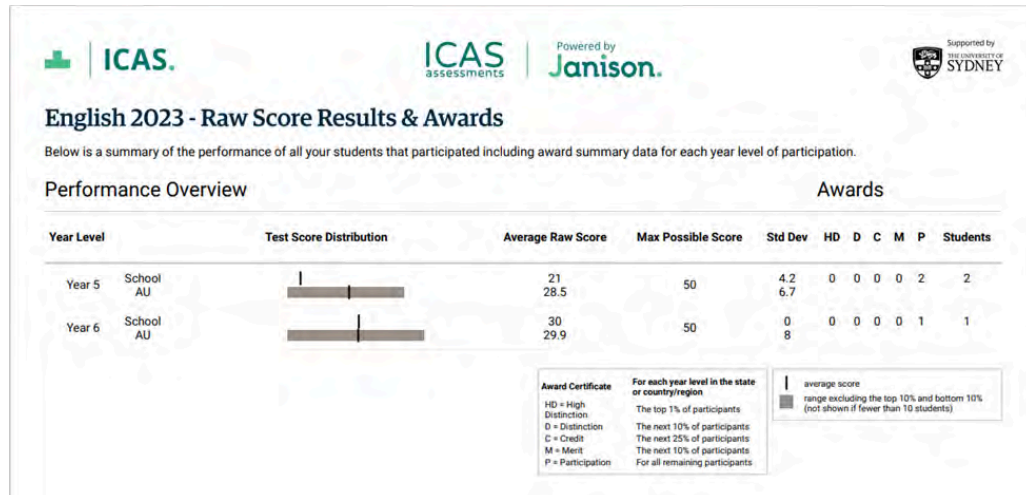
